## Research Reflection Paper

At the beginning of this project, I was under the impression that I more or less had a path for my research project. Since I had exposure to the field of marketing, I thought I would simply explore interview marketers about their field, and I would be able to provide insights into the marketing writing education at UC Berkeley. I thought it would interesting to explore this field I hoped to pursue professionally, and I could develop greater connections with people in my field. Therefore, I painstakingly constructed my proposal based on the guidelines, and I admittedly and naively thought that I was ready to embark on this research project. With this in mind, I submitted my research proposal, and then, my "perfect" plan started to implode. Upon receiving my proposal, there were a couple of issues that were immediately pointed out to me regarding my project. My topic was too broad and interviewing individuals is not a reliable way to ensure that research is finished. With this feedback, I learned a valuable lesson when it comes to research: you can never be too narrow with your topic. Facing obstacles in my proposal, my first inclination was to rework my plan. I reached out to professionals and using the web, I compiled a list of potential documents that I could analyze further through a research project. While this idea eventually fell through, I was able to gain some practical skills in communicating with professionals: learning to send emails and the right time of the day to ensure response and remember to promptly thank an individual for time. I definitely brushed up on some email etiquette skills through this phase of my projects. Ready to start exploring a specific document in marketing, I quickly learned that most of the documentation I wanted to analyze was private and internal. Therefore, I could not access these documents, which rendered by new idea impossible. Consequently, this led me to the next phase of the research process: throwing away your ideas and starting from scratch.

Normally, I would be scared too completely let go of an idea that I had grown attached to, but I learned that through this project, for the sake of progress, sacrifices must be made. When presenting this information to an audience unknowledgeable about my topic, this really gave me a different perspective as to how someone understood my research. With this feedback, I could go to my writeup and have a better idea of where changes needed to be made and how I could improve my path of logic in my research write-up. Overall, I felt that this entire project has made the concept of research less daunting. Moreover, I feel more equipped to do research for the rest of my college career.
